From the Director's Desk

Kemmerer Voices July 2017

July marks the start of a new Fiscal Year at Kemmerer Village and the start of a third year that the State of Illinois does not have a budget. Like many Social Services programs, the burden of this situation for Kemmerer

Village has become heavier, with each passing year. Within the past six months, four more agencies with Residential Treatment programs have closed due to the State's inability to pay its bills. Those four agencies join several others that have closed over the past 18 months. As I write this, we're awaiting over \$900,000 from the State of Illinois for the services we've provided to the youth placed here over the past year, with no certainty of when or if that will be paid to us.

The lack of a State Budget over the past 24 months only compounds a more significant issue: the State of Illinois sets the rate at which it will pay for Residential Treatment services and that rate has increased only 2% over the past twelve years. During that same twelve year span, the costs to provide quality service for youth in our care have, on average, increased 3% every year. As a result, the amount of donations and other private funds needed to support yearly operating costs has grown from 15% twelve years ago to nearly 30% this year.

Kemmerer Village's Residential Treatment program is not at risk of closing anytime soon, despite these bleak circumstances. Thanks to the longstanding generosity of our supporters and good stewardship by the Board of Directors over these years we've been able to maintain the excellence of care that our youth need and deserve. We have been blessed to have reserves to bridge the gaps created by the above circumstances, thus far. But the rate at which we've had to draw from these reserves the past two years is becoming unsustainable, especially if this budget impasse continues for a third and even fourth year.

Kemmerer Village provides care to the most vulnerable of Illinois' citizens, children and youth. They do not have the voice to advocate for themselves, so I ask that you help us do that for them. Please contact your state representatives and/or Governor's office to advocate for them and an end to this budget impasse. Thank you and God bless.

Through The Years!

During your visit to Kemmerer Village you will see many landmark buildings throughout our rural seventy acres. Several of the cottages have been named for our generous donors dating back to the early years and up through the decades. These buildings have served generations of children and young people starting with the Kemmerer Orphanage, opening its doors in May, 1914. Philip and Sarah Kemmerer witnessed the needs of children and families in distress and took the opportunity to "help make a difference." Per their final wishes they left their 400 acre farm and assets to the Presbyterian Churches of Central Illinois to create a home "for the orphans and friendless poor of all denominations." This 103 year old building is still called home to more than one generation as they continue to revisit the Kemmerer Village campus.

In the fifties, cottages were built to reflect a more family like environment. During this time a gymnasium was constructed for indoor activities. Later in the eighty's a large new addition was added to the gymnasium. This building was to

be known as the Fergusson Educational and Recreational Center. Today our on-grounds school continues to be a major asset to the programs on our campus enabling children who may not have previously been successful in the educational process to achieve new heights. The Recreational building is also providing children the opportunity and encouragement to reach their potential in areas of: sports, art, music, health and physical fitness.

The Margaret J. Dick Campus Center was completed in 2002. This building would become the center piece for activities around the campus. This construction project would create the first Chapel on our campus for church services, as well as a large new modern kitchen, dining area and offices for administrative personnel.

In 2010 the Franchois Arena was constructed to fill the need for a new Equine Facilitated Therapy Program. Horses have been a part of the Kemmerer history for many years. The benefits of this program are immeasurable; many children will engage in this type of therapy rather then the traditional therapy setting. This program has proven to be very beneficial to the children at Kemmerer Village.

All of our years of progress and success have been made possible through generations of committed congregations and individuals. It is because of your ongoing support that Kemmerer Village is recognized today as one of the most respected child care facilities. We wish to thank all of you who are helping continue this ministry.

3v3 Basketball Tournament


